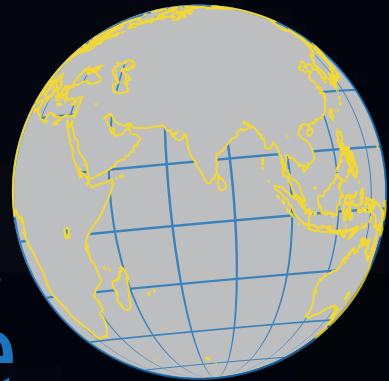

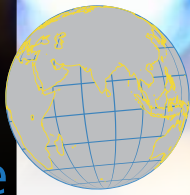

The use of working dogs in the military and in civilian law enforcement is on the rise. This session will ask providers to put on their detective caps to assess unexplained injury in children. Ms. Bacon will illustrate subtle – and not-so-subtle – signs of non-accidental trauma in pediatric patients, including in children with disabilities. She will also distinguish mimic conditions to help providers be confident in noticing red flags and reporting suspected abuse to protect this vulnerable population.

CONCURRENT SESSION:

Spin, Tumble and Yaw – Gunshot Wounds During One Day in The Most Dangerous Place on Earth

Chris J. Hartman, MD, FACEP

Dr. Hartman will examine ballistics and gunshot wounds amid the backdrop of Cite-Soleil, Haiti, once referred to as “the most dangerous place on Earth” by the United Nations. This gritty session will review the pathophysiology of GSW with a focus on damage control resuscitation to replace massive fluid resuscitation as the standard of care. Dr. Hartman will take a unique real-life perspective, illustrating the havoc of one 24-hour period in Cite-Soleil — 18 bullets that found their mark on 11 victims.

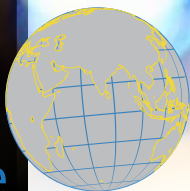

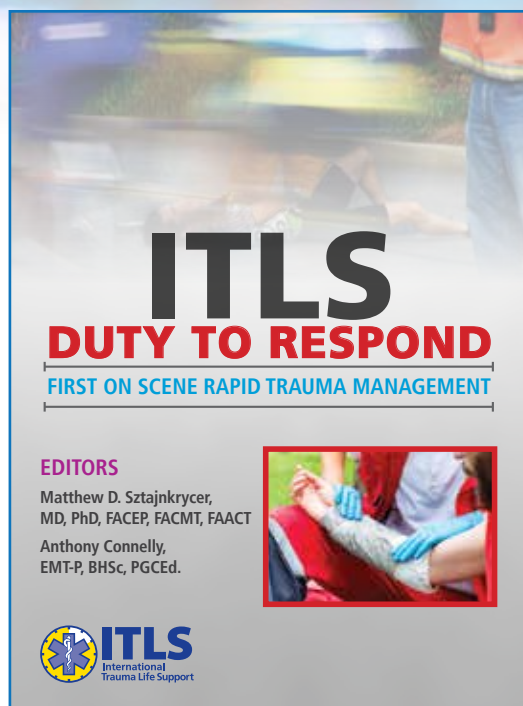

The ITLS High Threat course addresses the unique challenges of providing care in a high threat environment, centrally designed around the MARCH algorithm with the military or civilian high threat provider in mind. The course ensures compliance with TCCC and C-TECC guidelines. The High Threat foundation emphasizes hands-on instruction in elements of MARCH with integration into patient scenarios, including MCI and casualty collection point scenarios, as well as lessons from the most recent military conflicts and civilian terrorist events.

Eligibility: Open to all providers who are EMT or national equivalent; 68W or military equivalent; or have an operational need for TCCC-AC or TECC level training. Students receive an ITLS High Threat Provider certification upon completion.

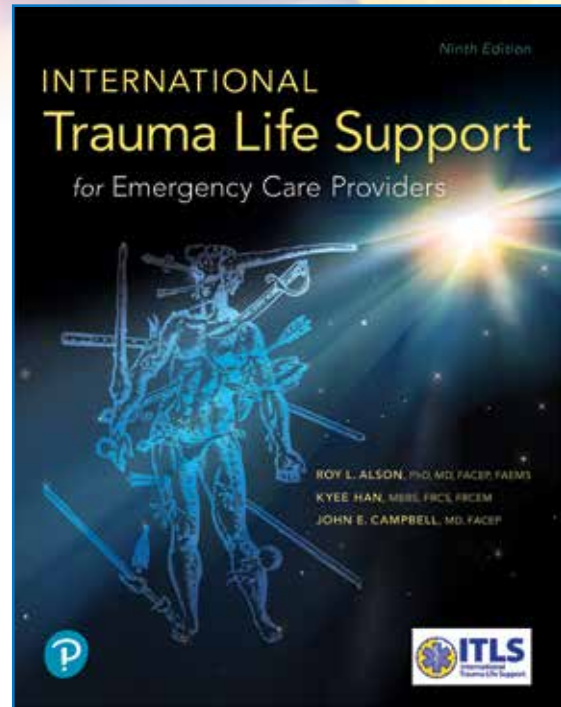

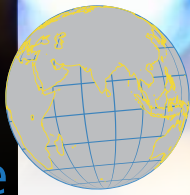

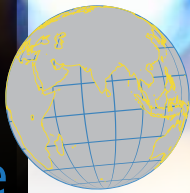
