# A Not-So-Clean Kill: RSI and the Physiologically Difficult Airway

Rapid sequence endotracheal intubation is commonly performed on critically ill patients, including those with complex deranged physiology. More than two decades of literature suggest that intubation may be harmful, and potentially lethal, in patients with severe trauma and hemodynamic compromise. The purpose of this talk is to discuss the indications for endotracheal intubation from an anatomic standpoint, and to review the identification and management of the physiologically difficult airway, in order to prevent a not-so-clean kill.





# Emergency Airway Management – A Skills Approach Workshop

Many trauma deaths are related to the inability to control the airway. Prevention of hypoxia requires both maintaining the airway and providing adequate tidal volumes. This skill intensive program will review both basic and advanced methods for securing the airway and maintaining adequate ventilations. This program is designed for those familiar with standard procedures and will progress to more complex situations such as trauma, unique anatomy, cricothyrotomy, and pharmacological assisted tubes. ### **ITLS High Threat Instructor Development**

### Matthew D. Sztajnkrycer, MD, PhD, FACEP

The newly released ITLS High Threat for Military and Civilian Providers course has been designed to meet military Committee on Tactical Combat Casualty Care (CoTCCC) and civilian Committee on Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (C-TECC) provider guidelines and curriculum. Using adult learning principles, scenarios, skill stations and peer-focused learning, the ITLS High Threat for Military and Civilian Providers course provides the necessary training for the provision of life-saving care in the high-threat environment. The ITLS High Threat Instructor Development Course will review in a step-by-step manner the contents of the ITLS High Threat for Military and Civilian Providers curriculum, including slide decks, clinical vignettes, trauma lanes, and examination process. By providing background information and insight into course design, the Instructor Development Course will provide future instructors with the necessary information to successfully teach this new course. The Instructor Development Course fulfills one of the requirements for Lead Instructor certification.

**Eligibility:** Be among the first to qualify to teach the new ITLS High Threat course by attending the instructor development preconference course. Each High Threat course must have a Lead Instructor who is an ITLS instructor, or current TCCC-TECC instructor certification + SME experience. Other course instructors must have ITLS instructor certification and successful completion of the ITLS High Threat instructor course.

SME experience is defined as a minimum of 12 months real world operational medical experience within the past 5 years attached to a team operating in a high-threat environment. Documentation of SME experience must accompany the course registration form to be verified by ITLS. High Threat instructor card will be awarded to those instructors that qualify and successfully complete the workshop.

The course will be open to others who are interested in High Threat but do not plan to become instructors on a space available basis.


